

This conference marks the end of a three year ESRC-funded project on Lawyers, Conflict & Transition led by Professor Kieran McEvoy (School of Law, Queen's University Belfast) and Professor Louise Mallinder (Transitional Justice Institute, Ulster University).

Drawing on six key case studies (Cambodia, Chile, Israel, Palestine, Tunisia and South Africa) the project examined the role of lawyers during conflicts, dictatorships and political transitions (www.lawyersconflictandtransition.org).
